To participate in the sale, please detach and complete

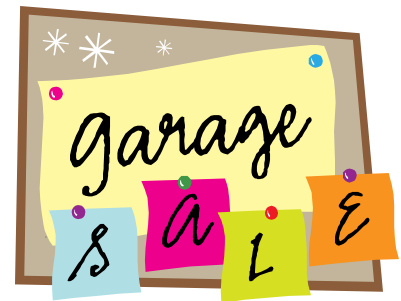

Some “Green” Gardening Tips

Kill weeds in a more earth-friendly way

Instead of using really nasty commercial chemicals to rid your garden of noxious weeds, where possible just try using water. Yes, water. The trick is to boil it first of course. Boiling water is particularly effective for use on weeds in the expansion joints on driveways and paths.



Grow your own food

Buying organic produce can

admittedly get pricey, so how about growing your own food? It's time to return to the use of gardens as food sources—you won't find fresher (or cheaper) eating anywhere else.

Make compost from kitchen scraps

Compost like a champ by throwing in your vegetable waste, instead of allowing it to be trucked off to the landfill. Known as "gardener's gold," compost enriches soil fertility by giving it a shot of high-powered, plant-loving nutrients. Aside from stimulating

healthy root development, the addition of rich and earthy compost also improves soil texture, aeration, and water retention.

Bring on the butterflies and bees

Provide a pesticide-free sanctuary for our pollinator pals, such as butterflies and bees. Grow a variety of native flowers such as wild lilac, goldenrod, and lemon balm. If you haven't already heard, we're in the throes of a major bee-loss epidemic. Because pollinators affect 35 percent of the world's crop production extending a little hometown hospitality could go a long way.

Community Gardening in Huffman

Some of you may have noticed that what used to be a vacant lot at 24-26 Centre St. has turned into a vegetable garden! A few families in the neighborhood with yards too shady or too small to grow vegetables have adopted the plot and are working hard to grow our own food this Summer.

Please feel free to stop by and see our progress. The lettuce, spinach, and peas are flourishing! We even got a grant from Montgomery County to buy some decorative plants which you'll see planted in in the front of the garden.

We do also hope to get a sign eventually labeling the space as the Huffman Community Garden and maybe we'll even score some fencing to keep critters from stealing all our produce.

Next year, we'll have plenty more free beds in which any of our Huffman neighbors are welcome to adopt and cultivate as their own. There may even be a lot near you that your household could adopt for the same purpose. The owners of the unused land are
